Finally, our most recent blog features a group that we call **“First but Not Last”**. These women were the first female leaders of agricultural trade associations and when asked to share some of their insights to mentor those who follow in their footsteps, this is what they said:

1. **You know more than you think you do.** There is a place for everyone in agriculture and women are leading the way. Your voice adds an important perspective that is vital to discussions and decisions being made. You know more than you think and are more qualified than you know.
2. **Say yes to new and different opportunities.** It is important to know yourself and your strengths and weaknesses. It is equally, if not more important, to take risks and seize new opportunities. Your path to leadership may change over time but each experience along the way will make you a stronger person.
3. **Look to others for guidance.** At all stages of your career, it's important to have both mentors and mentees. Share what you have learned from others. There are other women out there who are also looking to advance into leadership position, not just in agriculture, but in all fields across the globe. Use that network to grow and thrive!

What's Ahead

Deputy Secretary Harden will be hitting the road with Members of Congress to hold a series of women in agriculture panel discussions throughout the country. The intention of these events is to hear from women in all segments of agriculture about barriers to advancing their careers, opportunities for growth, lessons learned, advice for new/young women interested in agriculture, resources for networking/knowledge-sharing, and to spur discussions that will help advance the role of women in agriculture.

The first event will be held on May 27 with Senator Amy Klobuchar in St. Paul, MN, followed by a joint event with Senator Heidi Heitkamp in Fargo, ND on May 28. Our hope is to plan additional USDA and Congressional events focused on women in agriculture across the country this year.
